10th September, 2012: Afternoon Bird Highlights & Welcome Dinner

We met up as a group at 2.30pm on Monday 10th September and after brief introductions all round, headed down out to Knuckey Lagoon's. Here we saw a good number of wetland birds, some such as Radjah Shelduck and Pied Heron were lifers for those who had not visited Darwin before.

Then we visited the mangrove boardwalk at East Point, picking up several of the mangrove specialists, then searched the monsoon forest for the Rainbow Pitta. Unfortunately no Pitta was seen or heard, but we did see Red-tailed Black Cockatoos and Agile Wallabies.

We returned to the Novotel, enjoyed some drinks from the Jabiru Bar and did our first bird call for the trip. this was followed by an enjoyable three course meal at the Zest Restaurant.

<u>11th September, 2012 Highlights: Fogg Dam & Leichhardt Point</u> <u>Sunset</u>

After breakfast at accommodation we headed out to Fogg Dam. Even though the water level is very low at Fogg Dam, particularly from the Pandanus lookout, we still saw 32 species, including a Tawny Frogmouth on it's nest. We had coffee and tea at the Pandanus lookout and then moved on to the Adelaide River Bridge. Here we heard Mangrove Golden Whistler and saw a Buff-sided Robin.

We stopped briefly at the excavation pits near Mary River. Apart from a large number of Diamond Doves and a White-necked Heron, not much else was around. then we had lunch at Mary River Billabong before heading down to Bird Billabong. Being the middle of the day and very hot we didn't spend a lot of time here, but managed to see Northern Rosella, Rufous-throated Honeyeater and Banded Honeyeater.

From there we continued on to Point Stuart Road, and did the Brian Creek Monsoon Forest walk. The area around the forest was severely burnt, and even into the forest a little bit. We heard forest specialists such as Rainbow Pitta, Rose-crowned Fruit-Dove and Emerald Dove, but failed to get good views of these.

We arrived at Wildman Wilderness Lodge on time and ready to settle into our accommodation and then head out to Leichhardt Point for sunset drinks and canopés. The way was unfortunately blocked by fallen trees so we pulled up at another nearby wetlands for drinks. On the way back to the resort we saw Bush Stone-curlews.

<u>13th September, 2012 Highlights: Billabong Cruise & Kakadu</u> <u>National Park</u>

The Home Billabong Cruise began at dawn, with the early morning light engulfed in a combination of fog and smoke haze. The cruise on the billabong was nevertheless beautiful with highlights being lovely views of two Azure Kingfishers and White-bellied Sea-eagles in pursuit of one another and honking.

After breakfast we packed up and headed to Kakadu, with a brief stop at South Alligator River then on to the Mamukala wetlands birdhide.

We had lunch at Ubirr and got good views of a pair of Varied Lorikeets feeding in the treetop near Cahill's crossing. On the Manggarre monsoon forest walk we had glimpses of the Rainbow Pitta and later, at the Bardedjilidji Sandstone walk we searched for the Chestnut-quilled Rock-pigeon. We dipped out on the walk but then and got great views on the roadside as we drove out.

We arrived at our accommodation at Cooinda after dark and saw Bush Stone-curlew as we arrived. We were given a very pleasant welcome, sat down to nice dinner, and reviewed our sightings for the day.

<u>14th September, 2012 Highlights: Yellow Waters Sunset Cruise</u> After an early breakfast we head off for Burrunggui and search for more escarpment endemics. We succeed in finding White-lined Honeyeater and Partridge Pigeon but dip on Banded Fruit-Dove and Sandstone Shrike-thrush. We get a brief glimpse of the lone Rainbow Pitta flying overhead after calling repeatedly for some time. We had some great views of a male and female Black Walleroo.

We enjoyed a picnic lunch at Anbangbang Billabong and went back to Cooinda. Most of us needed a rest so we had a break until it was time to join the 4.30pm Yellow Waters Cruise. This was a highlight for the whole trip! We had the 'Balanda', eight seat fishing vessel, for our exclusive use. Our skipper, Margaret, did a great job taking us around the Yellow Waters billabong and South Alligator River. There were great views of Little Kingfishers, a pair of Barking Owl, and a Buff-sided Robin, as well as all the usual water birds. Dozens of Brolga and Magpie Geese filled the sky on sunset.

We left Cooinda early and travelled along the Kakadu Highway towards Pine Creek. Our first main stop was Edith Falls creek, where we staked out a vantage point over the water in the hopes of seeing some Gouldian Finches coming to drink. We did see some juveniles, and planned to get back to the same location early the next morning.

Some of us enjoyed a swim at Edith Falls and we had lunch. Special sightings here included Yellow-tinted Honeyeater.

After lunch we headed down to Mataranka in the hopes of seeing the rare Red Goshawk. We saw it's nest but the bird was nowhere in sight. We did see a White-bellied Sea-eagle feeding on carrion on the side of the highway! We travelled back to Katherine where we stayed at Knott's Crossing for the night.

16th September, 2012 Highlights: Katherine to Darwin

Again, an early start, in the hopes of getting to Edith Fall's Creek in time to see birds coming to drink. We did see Gouldians and one female Hooded Parrot. Pauline spotted a mature Black headed morph amongst the immature Gouldians.

Next we visited Ferguson River which was dominated by Friarbirds, but there were some Banded Honeyeaters, then we went on to Pine Creek. No Hooded Parrots to be seen this time but we got nice views of Grey-crowned Babblers in the town sports ground. After a lunch stop near Bridge Creek we continued on our way back towards Darwin, with a swimming stop at the beautiful Berry Springs.

Then we visited Howard Springs and managed to get good views of a Rainbow Pitta at last! And a brief glimpse of a Rose-crowned Fruit-Dove... Then it was back to the Novotel for the last night in Darwin for most of the group.

From there we went down to Rapid Creek and were treated to an impromptu presentation of Aboriginal culture by a traditional owner from the Blue Mud Bay area in Arnhemland. We saw quite a few birds in the area too, bringing our total sightings for the trip to 156 by my reckoning. (This number includes the ones heard only)

So then it was back to the Novotel for a 12.00pm check out, bringing the tour to a close. It was a great tour and a pleasure to lead, we started as strangers and finished as friends. It will be nice to remain in touch.
